# Screening: Special retrospective of Colectivo Zhigoneshi's works at Birkbeck University, London. May 16-17, 2016.

I was invited to participate in a Q&A and post-screening talk at the Birkbeck Arts Festival in London.

I was invited to participate on a public Q&A panel following a screening of the film *Nanook of the North* accompanied by a live, new soundtrack, composed by the band Dead Rat Orchestra specially for the event. The 20-minute panel, led by Professor Marcus Banks, Head of Anthropology at Oxford University, also included two members from the band.

# Exhibition: 'EcoCentrix: Indigenous Arts, Sustainable Acts'. Bargehouse, Oxo Tower Wharf, South Bank, London. October 23- November 11, 2013.

I was one of the organising members of a major exhibition on contemporary Indigenous performance arts. In particular, I was responsible for the curation of the film programme, which included both a continuous loop programme of shorts in a designated projection room in the exhibition venue, and some special events at other cinemas in South London. I was also responsible for securing collaborations with 3 of the invited Latin American artists who came to London during this time, exhibited their work, and held workshops: Victorino Tejaxún (Guatemala), Irma Poma Canchumani (Peru) and David Hernández (Venezuela).

# International Conference: 'In the Balance: Indigeneity, Performance, Globalization', October 23 – 27 2013. University of Notre Dame, central London campus.

I assisted in the running and organisation of this major international conference, and presented a paper on my research. I also helped translate for non-Anglophones. With an explicit focus on performance, this international and interdisciplinary conference examined contemporary expressions of indigeneity as a current, politicized and deeply resonant cultural force in our unevenly connected world.

# Symposium: 'Recasting Commodity and Spectacle in the Indigenous Americas'. London. November 22-23, 2012.

Co-convenor and primary organiser for this international symposium, organised in partnership with the Institute for the Study of the Americas (ISA). The event examined how artists and communities negotiate and challenge the commodification, exoticisation and spectacularisation

of Indigenous performance. Highly interdisciplinary in nature, the symposium brought together 45 researchers, with a large contingent from overseas, and featured twenty papers over two-days from a range of disciplines.

## Passengerfilms night, Roxy Bar & Screen, London, November 12, 2012

I was invited to curate an evening of ethnographic and Indigenous film for this monthly film club, which explores the connection between geography and cinema. All of the productions screened shared a concern with territory and landscape, their cultural significance and physical materiality. The opener for the evening was *Nanook of the North* (Flaherty, 1922), and two recent Indigenous-authored shorts from Latin America complemented the feature, *Já Me Transformei Em Imagem* (Zezinho Yube, Brazil, 2008) and *Mu drua* (Mileidy Orozco Domicó, Colombia, 2011). The evening's screenings were interspersed with commentary from Felix Driver (RHUL), Michelle H. Raheja (University of California-Riverside), and myself.

## XI Festival Internacional de Cine y Video de los Pueblos Indígenas, Colombia, Sept. 2012

I attended and participated in the XI International Indigenous Film and Video Festival organised by the CLACPI (umbrella organisation for Indigenous film and video in Latin America). During the festival, I gave a working paper on Indigenous audiovisual aesthetics. I also assisted with the simultaneous translation in English and French for the directors from the Québecois collective, Wapikoni Mobile, and for Raymond Kelly, from Australia. School workshop on Latin American and Indigenous Cinema, St. Marylebone C.E School, London, March 8, 2012 and June 2013.

With the form teacher, I gave a three-hour workshop to 16-18 year old students at a comprehensive school in London. The workshop was delivered in the target language to students of Spanish and introduced them to the analysis of film and social context.

## Interviews conducted with Indigenous Latin American filmmakers, March 2011

As part of the 2011 Native American Film and Video Festival hosted at the National Museum of the American Indian in New York, I conducted three interviews with Indigenous filmmakers from Latin America: Juliana Julujuj (Kaqchikel Maya, Guatemala), Geodiel Chindicué (Nasa, Colombia), and Amado Villafaña (Arhuaco, Colombia). I also coordinated and transcribed another two interviews with Nicolas Ipamo (Chiquitano, Bolivia) and Eriberto Gualinga (Sarayaku Kichwa, Ecuador). ## X Festival Internacional de Cine y Video de los Pueblos Indigenas, Ecuador, October 2010

I attended and participated in the principal Indigenous film festival for the Latin America region, held bienially. During the festival I assisted with translation and interpreting from French and English into Spanish and viceversa. In particular, I helped the Wapikoni Mobile Team (Québec, Canada), Victor Masayesva Jr. (Hopi, USA) and Eric Wijngaarde (Suriname) communicate with their Latin American peers.

## Latin America Research Group. Royal Holloway, University of London. Oct. 2009 - Jan. 2013

Founder and convenor of the Latin American Research Group (LARG) at Royal Holloway, since October 2009. The group meets 6-8 times a year to share ideas and work in progress across research areas in order to encourage greater interdisciplinarity in our work and foster new networks of collaboration. Subsequent to a grant awarded by SLAS in 2012, I was able to invite four researchers from other universities to give papers to the Group.
